From the Desk of Fr. Leo

Saints are extraordinary people, but one of the most extraordinary things about them is their humility. Frankly, their humility at times seems to border on the unreal. Take St. Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles, for example. His writings make up a large portion of the New Testament, and we frequently hear his letters read at Mass. He was indeed a great man, full of love for Christ and his fellow human beings, a man of wisdom and zeal. And yet he spoke of himself as the worst of sinners. St. Vincent de Paul is famous the world over for his wonderful works of charity. He spent a lifetime in the service of others. When he died at the age of eighty, it was more from exhaustion than old age. But this magnificent saint referred to himself as "a miserable wretch" and declared that he was unworthy of even the simple food he consumed. These two saints are but two examples among the many.

Were the saints a little psychotic on this point of humility, or were they actually in touch with reality in a deeper way than the so-called "normal" person? Let it be understood that the saints were not psychotic, that they were in profound touch with the Great Reality, God Himself. The reason they could sincerely feel such deep humility was that they compared themselves with God, and not with their fellow men or women. Their faults, their failures, their weaknesses were manifestly clear to themselves in the brilliant light of God's perfection.

If we could only learn to compare ourselves with God, how could we feel anything but humility? Pride comes from a false point of comparison. These days, it is commonplace to read in the papers or hear from the television, Facebook, Twitter etc. about people whose lack of morals is notorious. Drug dons make fortunes in a narcotic rocket, the effect of which reduces people to a state that is lower than that of animals, and they compound the gross disrespect for the dignity of human beings by coldly decreeing the murder of competitors who get in their way. Some celebrities whom we idolize, produce only disgust in us by their apparent disregard for the permanence and sacredness of marriage.

It is easy to feel pretty proud of ourselves in comparison with these types of persons. The comparison makes us feel complacent, and the desire for such a comfortable feeling is behind a lot of prejudice, racial and otherwise. Looking down on others gives us a sense of personal

elevation. If you are under six feet, you are short by today's standards; but if you could manage to live among pygmies, you would think of yourself as a giant.

A pride that is produced by comparing ourselves with despicable people, or with people that we may consider as despicable, is condemned by Jesus. The complacency it begets inhibits our spiritual growth, and even from a natural point of view puts us in an unhealthy state of mind. God's own perfection is the ideal toward which we must strive. We will never reach this ideal – but keeping the ideal, this proper perspective on life, should be a healthy incentive to keep on trying to improve ourselves.
