

Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

February 12, 2023

From the Desk of Fr. Leo

We are mostly not a people who experience ourselves as being bound by law. Even in a year marked by the impact of changes in health care, tax laws and no – smoking ordinances, civil laws are not a major factor in our lives. Our religious lives also are lives under the new covenant. What then do we hear as we gather to listen to the words from Matthew's Gospel?

We are no strangers to preoccupation with the external. In many ways, our culture encourages us to skim the surface and to ignore what is underneath. We have failed to grasp the secret which the fox shares with the Little Prince in Antoine de Saint – Exupery's little book "The Little Prince." The fox tells the prince. "It is only with the heart that one can see rightly; what is essential is invisible to the eye." We still need to hear the emphasis in the Gospel on what is internal. We need to hear the invitation in Jesus' teaching to go beyond the surface of things to discover what is essential. We need to hear the call of the radical new claim of love in our lives, so that we are delivered from doing things merely because they are expected or correct or because they look good. We need to face our inner motivations, desires, and priorities and to hold them up to new standards of honesty and love which Jesus gave to his followers. We need to examine and respond to the demands of relationship to Jesus.

Of course this response comes from individual selfunderstanding and action. But it does not stop there. Jesus' preaching of the kingdom was not addressed to individuals, but to a community. Matthew wrote the words of this Gospel lesson for a community of believers. We gather together as a community to hear and respond to those words, to that preaching and teaching. We may come to church seeking inner transformation, but we also come to a place where that deep spiritual experience is spoken about and shared. What would a spiritual experience be like? It is to be deeply known and understood, to feel that we are among people who shared that experience.



The love, the new covenant, is not just an abstract philosophical concept or a moral precept each individual Christian seeks. It is a reality here among us. We are brought in touch with the reality of the love of Christ each time we celebrate the Eucharist. This reality of God's presence is available, not just for personal renewal, but for strengthening the community for living the radical new claim of love. One of the Eucharistic prayers in the Episcopalian liturgy asks that we be delivered "from the presumption coming to the table for solace only and not for strength, for pardon only and not for renewal." Even when we are encouraged to pay attention to our internal motivation and transformation, we are not encouraged to get stuck there. We are called to go beyond mere observance of conventions and commandments, to go deeper into a relationship which calls us to respond. And then our response will be action to show ourselves far different from the Pharisees and doctors of the law. In that way we will begin to understand and to participate in the fulfillment Jesus offers.
